The role of CASE in terms of recruitment, retention and development for practitioners without CASE-accredited qualifications



The primary role of CASE is to accredit high quality education and training programmes/courses that promote best ultrasound practice and ensure that ultrasound practitioners are safe and competent to practise, whilst considering informed views of service needs



Work with education providers with a view to achieving successful accreditations and reaccreditations



Annual evaluation and analysis of CASE-accredited programmes and courses using the CASE Annual Programme Monitoring Review (APMR) process to obtain a range of performance data



Provide training sessions for education providers and CASE accreditors



Co-production of guidance documents with individual member organisations



The role of CASE in terms of recruitment of practitioners without CASE-accredited qualifications


- To determine whether entry requirements are appropriate in order to facilitate student success. For example, an initial audit of the suitability of the proposed clinical placement
- To determine whether education providers have robust on-boarding procedures that do not disadvantage practitioners without CASE-accredited ultrasound qualifications
- To determine whether domestic and international student fees are applied accurately, with a range of payment options available
- To determine whether education providers offer a wide range of programmes/courses which meet the needs of applicants wishing to undertake continuous professional development to extend their scope of practice



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
Widening Participation

The role of CASE in terms of retention of student practitioners without CASE-accredited qualifications


CASE has a significant role to play in terms of maximising student retention due to the following quality assurance QA) aspects of its work:

- Accreditation of new programmes and courses
- Reaccreditation of existing programmes and courses
- Interim reviews of programmes and courses
- Approval of minor and major changes to programmes and courses
- Annual programme monitoring reviews
 (APMRs) which include scrutiny of the External Examiners' reports
- Support for new programme and course leads

Number of Students Awarded per Academic Year






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APMR Data on Student Attrition

- Exactly 1000 students were undertaking CASE-accredited programmes of study during the 2021-2022 academic year
- 58 (5.8%) students withdrew from their programme without achieving their intended award

The role of CASE in terms of development of practitioners without CASE-accredited qualifications

Ultrasound practitioners will have individual training needs based on:

- Service delivery demands
- Their own areas of interest and career aspirations
- Niche patient care pathways or areas of specialism
- New patient care pathways
- Use of new technology
- Requirements associated with new policies e.g. RCR requirement for interpretive, actionable reporting
- Change of role or workplace
- Return to work

A variety of options therefore need to be available to meet these CPD requirements

Register of Clinical Technologists

- Ultrasound practitioners with a CASE-accredited award can make a straight-forward application to be added to the register
- Ultrasound practitioners without a CASE-accredited award can apply via the equivalence route; however, these applications are currently taking over a year to process
